2011 Annual Report

WKNC is one of the few open-door agencies in a Priority Neighbourhood where one out of four residents live below the poverty line.

2011 was a pivotal year for the Weston King Neighbourhood Centre (WKNC). It was a year of growth and renewed optimism for the Centre.

We were very excited to celebrate WKNC's 10th anniversary throughout 2011. We held our second annual Community Festival & BBQ in August. Through applying to the Investing in Neighbourhoods program, we were able to hire a Community Worker and a Food Services Worker for a year to work alongside our three core staff. Another highlight was being awarded the 2011 Mayor's Community Safety Award.

WKNC has continued to place a high priority on involvement with the Toronto Drop-in Network (TDIN) and with the ongoing City-led Dropin Review and the *Measuring Success* project. This project is intended to develop strategies and tools for measuring the success and outcomes of individual drop-in centres. The implementation stage for *Measuring Success* takes place during 2012.

WKNC continued to be one of the few open-door agencies in a Priority Neighbourhood where one out of four residents live below the poverty line. The primary participant base of WKNC continued to be people who are homeless, under-housed, socially isolated or living in poverty in Weston-Mt. Dennis. Throughout 2011 we also saw an increase in the numbers of seniors, sole-support parents, recent immigrants, refugees and the 'working poor' accessing our

programs and services. The Weston area was hard hit by the recent federal cutbacks to Citizenship & Immigration Canada (CIC) and this has had a direct impact on WKNC. (...over)

WKNC faces some new and exciting opportunities for 2012. We recently applied to the Ontario Trillium Foundation for funding to hire an Executive Director for an initial two-year period. The lack of senior management staff has been identified for the past few years as one of the main organizational weaknesses of WKNC. We feel that this is an opportune time to take this step.

The City-led Revitalization Plan for Weston is a welcome initiative which will lead to significant changes to the neighbourhood.

WKNC may soon have a very unique opportunity to expand its catchment area and to undertake program and outreach activities in the Mt. Dennis portion of this Priority Neighbourhood. This would be undertaken in partnership with the congregation of Mt. Dennis United Church.

We are confident at WKNC that we make a real difference in peoples' lives. We make a special effort to make people feel welcomed and valued and to foster a sense that they are part of a community. WKNC is essentially about building community and in facilitating positive change in peoples' lives and in the community.

We are very thankful at WKNC to have an extraordinary Board of Directors, a solid team of local volunteers and very dedicated staff. We continue to be very grateful for our ongoing partnership with Central United Church and the continued support of the City of Toronto through Shelter, Support & Housing Administration. We are also thankful to our many partner agencies in particular the Daily Bread Food Bank, Second Harvest, Syme-Woolner and Albion Neighbourhood Services.

This year WKNC successfully met the necessary standards to be accredited with The United Church of Canada.

The goal of these standards is to ensure the highest level of care in delivering services through United Church ministries. We are very proud of this achievement and special thanks to Barbara Bisgrove for the hundreds of hours she put in to make this happen. Our ties with the Toronto Drop In Network have also strengthened. TDIN have demonstrated tremendous support this year by developing new and exciting strategies and providing the necessary support to implement them. We appreciate their leadership.

This year we chose to participate in the Investing in Neighbourhoods program, an initiative designed to help Ontario Works individuals train and connect with job opportunities in non-profit organizations. Barbara Bernhard and Terry O'Handley have made great contributions to WKNC as we help prepare them for their future employment in our industry. We plan to participate in program again as it's such a win/win for everyone involved.

Our regular staff of Ken Theobald, Myriam Canas-Mendes and Brenetta Nedd have done an exemplary job of adjusting to the many changes we have faced this year. They are to be commended for their extraordinary efforts.

Our biggest struggle continues to be the funding of our food coordinator position. Despite not being able to secure this necessary funding, the board and staff have done a great job of finding creative ways to find temporary solutions to this problem. Special thanks to Brenetta for her loyalty and hard work despite the situation. We feel confident that a solution is pending.

We are currently awaiting the approval of a two-year grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation for the position of executive director. We believe this new position will help us reach the next stage of our development, improve our funding opportunities and assist us to create new programming that will give our participants the opportunity to learn and develop the new skills and mindset necessary to move forward in their lives.

We continue to encourage our participants, staff, volunteers, and board to participate in our individual committees so that we can promote a cohesive and united environment for everyone to succeed and be heard.

Much thanks to the many people who have helped in the successful growth of WKNC to this point and for your continued support in the future.

Treasurer's Report for Fiscal 2011 and Summary Graphs

2011 found Weston King Neighbourhood Centre (WKNC) in good financial health, with audited financials being reported on a fund basis. Unrestricted cash reserves stand at \$30,000, representing 2 months contingency for operating costs.


WKNC is fortunate to receive continued funding for our Drop-in program through the City of Toronto's Shelter, Support and Housing Administration envelope. Our staff complement was strengthened by two workers under the Investing in Neighbourhoods program.

Thanks to our funders, we were able to acquire energy efficient washers, dryers, and a dishwasher, in addition to new tables and chairs for the dining hall.

WKNC's challenges going forward are to diversify our funding base, with an immediate focus of securing core funding for the Food Co-ordinator position, which is critical to the operation of the kitchen, provision of meals and food security services to the Weston-Mount Dennis community.

Valued Partners

Albion Neighbourhood Services provides outreach services, housing support and follow-up support to people in the area. Central United Church provides rent-free space, janitorial services and maintenance, as well as the Tuesday evening community supper delivered in partnership with several local faith communities. Daily Bread Food Bank provides a weekly fresh food delivery as part of the Nutritious Food to Drop-ins project. Elizabeth Fry Society provides a weekly "Work Safe Program" for women involved in the sex trade. Federation of Metro Tenant's Associations (FMTA) provides quarterly workshops on tenant's rights. Fred Victor provides housing help workers. George Brown College provides student placements. Project Water, provides bottled water for our participants during summer heat alerts. Project Winter Survival provides winter survival kits for our homeless and street-involved participants. Second Harvest provides the foundation for many of our meals. St. Elizabeth Healthcare sends a nurse practitioner to the Centre weekly. Syme-Woolner **Neighbourhood and Family Centre** provides a housing worker to help with eviction prevention, finding subsidized housing, getting people into or out of shelters, advocacy with landlords, and housing searches. They also provide a harm reduction worker who leads the peer workers in outreach activities in the area. Toronto Alliance for the Performing Arts provides tickets for theatre, dance & other cultural events. West Park Healthcare Centre: The Sandwich Samaritan group, provides 10 loaves of sandwiches weekly. Unison Health and Community Servcies conduct periodic on-site workshops healthcare. Windfall Clothing Service offers new clothing for distribution to participants.
